



Magic at midnight

J.K. Rowling fans of all ages camp out at local bookstores to be the first to get a peek at "Harry Potter and the Order of the Phoenix"

Last Friday night, hundreds of people were lined up waiting for the clock to tell them it was finally

midnight.

But they were not waiting on the latest installment of "The Matrix" or "Star Wars" franchises. They were waiting in line to buy the book latest about orphaned wizard boy named Harry Potter, fifth installment in the series.

"They have good characters and good stories; it's not like reading elementary books," Carden said. "Some things you just don't outgrow."

The series, which has already sold more than 170 million copies worldwide and sparked the creation of a new Bestseller's List for Children's Literature at The New York Times, also brings families and friends together.

Alex and R.C. Trussel's interest in Harry Potter peaked during the past year. Alex won the 10-and-under trivia contest, and R.C. tied for first place in the 10-and-over trivia contest at Books-A-Million.

Friends that had not seen each other since schools let out in late May came together for the countdowns. Julie Cleveland and Madison Hill. both 11, teamed up to win the costume contest at Books-A-Million.
